Background of the Gospel

Today we celebrate the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. As we do so, our Gospel invites us to consider Joseph's protection of Jesus in the face of danger. Just as in the announcement of Jesus' birth, an angel appears to Joseph in a dream. The angel warns him of Herod's plans to harm Jesus. Joseph follows the command of the angel and takes Joseph and Mary to Egypt, returning only after receiving word in another dream that it was safe to do so.

This feast is part of the Christmas season, so we should look at today's Gospel in the context of what Scripture tells us about Jesus' birth. Today's reading is found in the Gospel of Matthew, following the story of the visit of the Magi. Recall that Matthew's story about the birth of Jesus makes Joseph the primary character. Among Matthew's themes in this infancy narrative is Jesus as the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecies about the messiah. Indeed, the story of the Holy Family's flight to Egypt recalls the story of Moses in the Book of Exodus.

It should also be noted that today's reading omits the verses that recount Herod's order of the massacre of the infant boys in and around Bethlehem. We mark this event on the Feast of the Holy Innocents on December 28.

These events remind us of the difficult reality of Jesus' birth. While the story of the Magi's visit will be recalled in our liturgy on the Feast of the Epiphany, our Christmas celebration is made more sober by the recollection that not everyone received Christ's birth with joy or obedience. Herod's jealousy and malice contrast with Joseph's obedience to the words of the angel. The Holy Family's escape to Egypt and the massacre that Jesus is saved from remind us of the struggles and sacrifices that are required as preparation for God's salvation.

The **Holy Family of Nazareth—Jesus, Mary, and Joseph**— offers families today a simple yet profound example of how to live love, faith, and fidelity in everyday life. They were not a perfect family, nor were they free from difficulties. They experienced uncertainty, poverty, forced migration, and hard work. Yet, in all things, they trusted in God and remained united.

Mary teaches us how to listen and to be open to God's plan, even when it is not fully understood. Joseph shows us the strength of responsible silence, honest work, and loving protection of the home. Jesus, growing in obedience and simplicity, reminds us that the family is the first school of love, respect, and faith.

For families today, the Holy Family invites us to rediscover the importance of dialogue, patience, and forgiveness. It reminds us that love is built day by day through small gestures: sharing meals, listening to one another, praying together, and supporting each other in difficult moments. In a world marked by haste, division, and tension, the Holy Family encourages us to place God at the center of our homes, trusting that with Him, even trials can become paths of hope and blessing.

As a new year begins, we stand at a sacred threshold between what has been and what is yet to come. In this moment, Mary, the Mother of God, becomes our gentle guide. She teaches us how to look back with gratitude and forward with hope and trust in God.

Looking back with Mary helps us recognize God's faithful presence in every season of our lives.

At the same time, Mary leads us to look ahead with trust. She did not know all that the future would bring, yet she entrusted herself completely to God's promise. As we face a new year filled with uncertainties, decisions, and hopes, Mary reminds us that fear gives way to peace when we place our lives in God's hands.

With Mary as our model, the new year becomes not a burden of expectations but a journey of faith—walking forward with hope, courage, and confidence that God goes before us.
