The Pope's Monthly Intention (July): For a Eucharistic life

We pray that Catholics may place the celebration of the Eucharist at the heart of their lives, transforming human relationships in a very deep way and opening to the encounter with God and all their brothers and sisters.

17th Sunday in Ordinary Time Cycle A

First Reading 1 Kings 3:5,7-12

Solomon pleases God when he asks for a wise and understanding heart to better govern the people.

Gospel Reading Matthew 13:44-52

Jesus teaches about the Kingdom of Heaven.

Background on the Gospel Reading

Today's Gospel concludes three weeks of readings from the 13th Chapter of Matthew's Gospel. Throughout these three weeks we have heard Jesus' teaching crowds about the kingdom of heaven, and we have heard Jesus interpret some of his teachings for the disciples. In this week's Gospel, Jesus offers three more short parables.

The first two parables describe the great value of the kingdom of heaven. In the first parable, Jesus says that the kingdom of heaven is like a buried treasure that is worth possessing even if it means giving up everything else. In the second parable, Jesus proposes that the kingdom of heaven is like a pearl of great worth for which one will sell everything else to possess. These parables teach us that we are to place everything we value in the service of the pursuit of the Kingdom of God.

The third parable that Jesus proposes in today's Gospel is different from the first two, but it is reminiscent of the parable of the sower heard in last week's Gospel. The kingdom of heaven is compared to fishing with a wide net. After the fish have been collected, the good fish are kept and the bad fish are thrown away; so too, in the final judgment, will the wicked and the righteous be separated.

Today's Gospel concludes with a curious statement about the scribe who understands the kingdom of heaven. Here a metaphor is offered: this scribe is like the head of a household who "brings from his storeroom both the new and the old." The scribes referred to here are experts of Mosaic law. It is possible that Jesus is here instructing the early Christian community on how to proceed in the interpretation of Jewish law with respect to Jesus' "new" teaching. Jesus' teaching about the kingdom of heaven does not replace the Jewish tradition; it interprets it in a different light.

FORMATION COLUMN

Striking the Breast

When reciting the Confiteor at Mass, all strike their breast one time when saying, "through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault." The gesture has always been part of the post-Vatican II Mass. Prior to the Council, the priest and servers recited the Confiteor to each other and struck their breast three times. The gesture was reduced to a single strike.

Also prior to the Council, people struck their breast during the Lamb of God and the "Lord, I am not worthy" before Communion. However, these gestures were not carried into the post-Vatican II Mass. Some people have struck their breast during the Kyrie and the Glory to God, but this was never officially requested.

Today, when the priest recites Eucharistic Prayer I, he strikes his breast when saying the words, "To us, also, your sinful servants." Along with the Confiteor, these are the only two instances of striking the breast in the post-Vatican II Mass. In both cases, the gesture accompanies an acknowledgment of sin.

The gesture has biblical origins. In the Old Testament, women beat their breasts as a sign of loss—the maidens of Nineveh at the conquest of their city in the Book of Nahum (2:7), and the women of Jerusalem at the devastation of their pleasant fields and fruitful vines in Isaiah 32:12.

The New Testament offers two references, both in the Gospel of Luke, and these probably link more directly to the later liturgical practice. The tax collector, in contrast to the Pharisee, beats his breast while praying, "O God, be merciful to me a sinner" (18:13). Those who witnessed the death of Jesus on the Cross return home beating their breasts (23:48). When we strike our breasts during the Confiteor, we acknowledge that we are sinners, and that our sins have consequences.
